Student events and competitions prepare the next generation of rangeland stewards through testing their knowledge, and giving them the opportunity to develop their skills.

The following teams took first place for the WY SRM second annual Pro-Am Challenge, an event partnering an undergraduate student with a professional for the *URME*, and *Plant Identification*. This year's first place teams follow: *URME* Eric Ramerth, UW and Thad Berrett (US Forest Service); and *Plant Identification* BJ Bender, UW and Julie Kraft, Sublette County Weed and Pest District.

This year's High School Youth forum had youth from Upton and Green River. This event allows high school students to prepare and present about a rangeland topic of their choice. The youth with the highest score has the opportunity to attend and deliver their presentation at the International Society for Range Management's annual meeting – an all expense paid trip. Karen Lambert of Upton High School had this year's top score with her presentation titled *Studying the Impacts of Cattle Trailing in Weston County, Wyoming*.

#### Wyoming SRM Sending Upton Youth to National HSYF Competition in Corpus Christi By Shari Meeks, HSYF Chair

Another successful year of High School Youth Forum in Wyoming! The competition took place on November 4, 2015 during the joint convention with Wyoming SRM, WACD, and Weed & Pest. Participation this year was down, due to how soon our meeting followed the National FFA convention. However, both participants this year were from schools which we have not seen involvement in the past. Recognizing this, it is our hope that next year's participation increases as other schools begin to see the benefits of involvement in such an event. We also hope to see our long-time contenders from Worland High School return with vigor!

That being said, both participants did an excellent job. Korra Sheldon from Green River presented on the "Effects of Invasive Russian Olive on Green River Native Species". Korra's presentation was based on literature research and actual data collection in Green River.

Karen Lambert from Upton High School presented on "Studying the Impacts of Cattle Trailing on Weston County, Wyoming". Her presentation was based off of landowner interviews and data collection within Weston County. Her commanding presence and comfort with the materials she presented made her the top candidate. Although it certainly was a difficult decision, the judges decided to award Karen Lambert first place. We are excited to be sending Karen to the National SRM HSYF competition in Corpus Christi, TX in February. Best of luck, Karen!
